

## Royals remain on Cactus League roll

PEORIA, Ariz. (AP) — Cheeseburgers, fist bumps and smiles ruled inside the jovial Kansas City Royals clubhouse after Tuesday's 11-6 win over the Seattle Mariners.

It's almost as if the Royals don't want camp to end. They kept up their prolific offensive production, and in so doing set a club record for spring training wins with 23.

For what it's worth, Kansas City clinched finishing in first place in the Cactus League standings.

"The key to our success this year is going to be our pitching staff, because we can catch the ball," manager Ned Yost said. "If they're throwing strikes, we're going to be able to make plays and I think we're going to be able to score runs."

"It just gives you confidence going into the season knowing that everybody's ready, everybody's playing well," he said.

Kansas City entered the game leading the majors in team batting average, hits, doubles, runs scored and on-base percentage. The Royals recorded 18 hits against Se-

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## ACC runners hit high gear

*Storms don't slow track team at Alabama*

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TUSCALOOSA, Ala. — The Allen Community College track and field team battled more than the elements Friday and Saturday.

The Red Devils were the only junior college athletes competing at the Alabama Relays, hosted by the University of Alabama. The rest of the teams were from NCAA Division I schools, including Alabama, Georgia, Iowa and Indiana universities.

"Most of them were running their B squads, however the mid-major Division I schools were there at full strength," Allen coach Vince DeGrado said. "This was a great meet for us."

As has become the norm, a number of Red Devil athletes shined in the spotlight.

Most prominently among them was Chris Donald, who finished second overall in the 400-meter hurdles. Donald's time of 52.81 seconds qualifies him for the NJCAA national meet.

Donald now ranks first in the nation in the 400 hurdles

among all NJCAA runners.

Also qualifying for nationals was Josh Whittaker, who ran the 1500 meters in 4 minutes, 1.87 seconds, good for 31st overall. The world record for the 1500 is 3 minutes, 26 seconds set by Hicham LeEl Guerrouj of Morocco set in 1998.

The Allen men's 4x100-meter relay team of Kelvin Gant, Michael Burns, Je-

thro St. Hubert and Rodrick Simmons teamed to post a national-qualifying time of 41.96 seconds, placing them eighth. Gant, Burns and Simmons were joined by Antonio Duncan to finish 10th in the 4x200-meter relay with a time of 1:31.88.

"Antonio was slowed by a hamstring injury, but was still able to finish the race,"

DeGrado said.

In addition, the men's distance medley relay team of Josh Whittaker, Tucker Morgan, Dakota Parker and Donald set a school record of 10:21.32. The quartet shaved 17 seconds from a school mark that had stood since 1967.

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## US forges tie with Mexico in World Cup qualifier

MEXICO CITY (AP) — The Americans were clinging to a scoreless tie, seconds away from earning a rare point in Mexico, when Angel Reyna's shot darted perilously close to the goal.

Brad Guzan lunged, smothering the ball with his body.

"It's always going to be a bit hectic and a bit crazy, especially late in the game," Guzan said. "You're never going to come to a place like Azteca and go out and have

it nice and easy. So we knew at some point, it was going to come, the pressure was going to come, and we were able to deal with it."

Guzan swatted away shot after shot, young defenders Omar Gonzalez and Matt Besler showed the poise of veterans and the Americans hung on for a 0-0 draw Tuesday night, earning only their second point in a World Cup qualifier at Azteca Stadium.

The tie moved the U.S. (1-

1-1) into third place in World Cup qualifying for the North and Central American and Caribbean region after three of 10 matches, one point behind Panama (1-0-2). The Americans and Costa Rica both have four points, but the Ticos are ahead on goal difference.

After playing at Jamaica on June 7, the U.S. will be at home for four of its last six qualifiers.

"We wanted to win, but we are pleased with the result," coach Jurgen Klinsmann said. "They

gave us everything they have."

Klinsmann was criticized after the opening 1-0 loss at Honduras in February, with unidentified players and people close to the team questioning his tactics and leadership in a Sporting News report before last week's home win over Costa Rica.

Mexico coach Manuel De la Torre is sure to come under fire after a third straight draw, which dropped El Tri (0-0-3) to second-to-last place in the standings. The top three

teams in the group, which also includes Honduras, advance to next year's World Cup in Brazil next year while the No. 4 nation meets New Zealand in a home-and-home playoff for another berth.

Mexico certainly had its chances with a whopping 17-1 advantage in shots and 15 corner kicks, three just in the last two minutes of stoppage time. But El Tri was plagued by poor finishing and dismal execution on set pieces.

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## Spring chill no deterrent for bass

OSAGE BEACH, Mo. — The air temperature had dropped to about 30 degrees, and a strong north wind kicked up whitecaps on Lake of the Ozarks.

So why was Marcus Sykora standing at the bow of his bass boat, saying this was his favorite time of the year to go after big bass?

"Some fishermen think you have to wait until the weather warms up before you can catch bass," said Sykora, who was wearing several layers of clothing and had a hood pulled tight around his face. "But by the time they get out, they've already missed the best time to catch big fish."

"These big bass are the first ones to move up. They'll leave their winter spots and go to the chunk-rock banks and secondary points next to deep water to sun and start feeding. That's when I want

to be out here."

Moments later, Sykora provided a demonstration. He launched a long cast with a suspending jerkbait, then cranked it down, jerked it several times, then let it sit for a 12 count. As the bait was sitting motionless in the water, a bass swam up and crushed it.

Sykora set the hook, then watched as the bass wallowed to the surface.

"It's a big one," he said as he fought the fish.

In a matter of seconds, he had the pot-bellied bass in the boat and was celebrating another cold-water catch.

Sykora placed the bass on a scale and found that it weighed 5 pounds, 6 ounces. After posing for a few pictures, he slid it back into the water and he was casting for more.

all individuals handled themselves under conditions like we experienced."

And while the race didn't go off as planned, "there will be a next time. Count on it," Steele said.

Of the 54 100-mile racers who ran the trail from Ottawa to Iola and back, five completed the race before it was called off.

Brandon Purdeu, 25, of Lawton, Okla., was by far the quickest, besting his nearest pursuer by nearly seven hours.

Purdeu navigated the 100-mile trek in 16 hours, 9 minutes and 10 seconds.

The other finishers were Randy Ellis, 61, Sapulpa, Okla., 23:07:40; John Nobles, 28, Cleveland, Okla., 23:24:36; Rene Villalobos, 54, Fort Worth, Texas, 23:44:02; and Jason Ryan, 38, Tacoma, Wash., 24:57:33.

In addition, Steele said a portion of the proceeds from the weekend race will go to the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society (\$450) and the Prairie Spirit Friends of the Trail (\$250).

"Massive congratulations to everyone who was gutsy enough to toe the starting line, in either race," Steele said. "I am very grateful to have been a part of it. What I witnessed from runners and staff was nothing short of miraculous, and pushed my belief in the overall drive and capacity of the human spirit to an entirely new level."

Plans already are in the works for next year, Steele said.

Registration for the March 29, 2014, race should begin in the few weeks.

And there were more to be caught. Fishing solely with the Mega-Bass jerkbait, he caught and released eight other keepers Wednesday on the first day of spring, including several others in the 4-pound range.

An outstanding day? Well ... let's just say he's done it before. Many times.

The biggest bass, he ever caught \_ a monster that weighed 9 pounds, 4 ounces \_ came on a suspending jerkbait fished at this time of the year in 1996 at Lake of the Ozarks. And he routinely does well in tournaments in March at the big lake. Consider an FLW EverStart tournament on March 14-16. In three days, he weighed in 14 bass totaling 51 pounds, 9 ounces, good for third in the prestigious event.

So what's his secret? He leaves little to chance. He doesn't simply drop his trolling motor and start fishing down a likely looking rock bank. Instead, he says, "I fish a specific spot on a spot. I fish targets."

Sykora put those targets there. He works tirelessly to sink brush and trees along the banks where he thinks the bass will move up first.

He has those locations marked on his GPS, and uses the satellite technology to guide him to the brush and trees he has put out.

Lure selection is a given. In the cold water of early spring,

suspending stickbaits are the only way to go, he said. He makes sure the baits he is using will suspend perfectly in the water when he pauses his retrieve. If they rise slowly, he will wrap wire on the hooks until they work the way he wants them to.

"These suspending jerkbaits are ideal imitators of what is going on right now," said Sykora, who lives in Osage Beach and has an insurance business there. "You can watch struggling shad in the water. They take one kick, then they just there for a while."

"You can do the same thing with these baits. In this cold water, bass aren't going to chase anything. But if something suspends right in front of them, they'll take it."

Sykora will retrieve

the bait with several jerks, then he will pause the lure for up to 12 seconds. The hits always come when the bait is sitting still.

"Sometimes they'll hit like a freight train," he said. "Other times, you'll just feel weight on the end of your line."

That brings us back to the brush and trees that Sykora puts out. He casts beyond those targets and pulls his bait down to the point where he can suspend it just over the top of that cover. That's often when he will get a strike.

"A lot of times, these bass will be inactive and just sit down there in a brush pile," Sykora said. "But if an easy meal comes past, they'll come up and take it."

Other tricks of the trade? Sykora will use 8-pound test line to get better action from the

lure than if he would use heavier line. And he is careful not to fish too quickly in the cold water. With the fish sluggish, he wants his baits to imitate how the baitfish are reacting to the cold water.

Sykora will fish the suspending stickbaits from December through the middle of April. Once the bass show signs that they are willing to chase baits, he will often go to large spinnerbait. But until that happens, he knows there will be plenty of opportunities to catch a huge bass.

"Lake of the Ozarks is in tremendous shape right now," Sykora said. "It has a great population of bass, and lots of big ones, too."

"It's just a fun place to fish right now."

Even when the weather is downright nasty.

"We competed very well in some areas," DeGrado said. "When you go to a meet of this caliber, and travel as long as we did, you sometimes wonder how they'll react. "That was unfortunate, because those two were racing as invites," DeGrado said. "They were guaranteed to be

fast races."

The Red Devils resume action April 6 at the Emporia State Relays.
